2000 CALENDAR

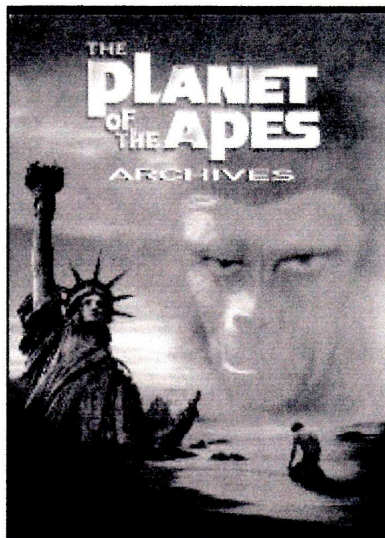
Dan Vernaet in Canada has designed a

THE ONLY GOOD COLLECTION IS A BODGED COLLECTION!

The UK Planet of the apes collection. An Overview.

The Planet of the apes collection boxed set: Widescreen.

*(Beneath, Escape, Conquest and Battle for the Planet of the apes
are only available as part of the boxed set)*

At last, in the UK, the Apes saga is given the Wide-screen and digital remastering treatment and while Fox Video can be congratulated for this long overdue overhaul (and credit where credit is due, the print and sound quality of all five films is stunning,) they have, in my opinion, bodged the entire thing.

The five movies are presented in rather flimsy cardboard sleeves collected inside a slipcase style box. (In the UK videos are normally presented in sturdy plastic cases.) The first movie has been given a brand new and very effective sleeve design while the four sequels suffer from vastly inferior photo- montages. (Also I might add, inferior to the sleeve designs from the last time they were released, around 10 years ago in standard ratio)

The sleeve boasts that this is a "Special anniversary edition" but confusingly gives no clue as to which anniversary the collection is actually celebrating. The collection is totally devoid of any booklets or other such "Commemorative" souvenirs and contains only the most basic of plot details by way of written information.

The sleeve advertises, somewhat misleadingly "25 mins of previously unseen footage" but be warned that these are no "Directors cuts" or "Special editions" The extra footage is only contained in short extracts from the 2 hour, American Movie Classics, documentary "*Behind the planet of the apes*" (Which was actually given away free in the USA to anyone who sent in a voucher contained within the boxed set. No such scheme is in operation with the UK release.)

The "Special collectors preview" of "*Behind the Planet of the apes*" can be found at the end of the first movie. One would think that the super imposed sub-title title would indicate that at some stage this very promising documentary will be released in its entirety in the UK but again, there is no further information within the boxed set to confirm or deny this. I therefore took the trouble to telephone Fox videos Public relations agency and was informed that "There are no current plans to release the full version"... Pissed off?... You betcha!

The films appear to be intact with the exception of *Battle* which, like previous releases, is missing some small scenes.

Unlike the U.S. edition, the films are supplied on only three cassettes. *Planet* and the *preview* are on tape 1. *Beneath* and *Escape* on tape 2 and *Conquest* and *Battle* on tape 3. Although this obviously keeps the price down it does smack of a cost cutting exercise and I feel the movies that Fox are supposedly so proud of, deserve better.

In all I think that this is a badly misjudged opportunity to present a product worthy of the description "Special collectors edition" Fox (UK) appear to have seriously underestimated the popularity of the Apes series among the public. (Evident by the title being at number one in its first week of release in most of the high street stores) and contented themselves with bashing out something cheap and cheerful instead. In recent years the Alien movies have been collected in various ways, all of which (Especially the Face-hugger case collection) have been far superior to this.

Although the boxed set is surprisingly modestly priced and although it will certainly satisfy the curious or the casual, the discerning collector and any fan of the Ape series will be left feeling disappointed.

"Now you have assumed the position of, Supreme Military Commander..... and all that entails.... there are certain elements of our history with which I must acquaint you."

Guide to Entries: P = planet, B = beneath, E = escape, C = conquest, BA = battle, TV = television

ALPHA CENTAURI- Trinary star system, 4.3 light years from Earth in the constellation of Centaurus. This was the destination of the Icarus 4, which had astronauts Viridon, Burke, and Jones aboard. Their voyage was interrupted by an solar flare from the Proxima red dwarf, the third and furthest star in the system.
TV

ALPHA-OMEGA NUCLEAR DEVICE - The most powerful and destructive device ever created. Its name means the beginning and the end. It was built by the United States to be used only as a doomsday scare tactic device to deter any threats. The device resembled a small ballistic missile which had a cobalt casing. The device was kept underground at a missile base in the San Francisco Bay Area where it survived the nuclear war. It was later transported underground across the country to the remnants of New York City by the mutant humans who worshipped it as a god. The device was detonated by Taylor in the year 3978. The results were total destruction. The Earth's atmosphere was basically set on fire, creating a chain reaction which left the planet lifeless. B,E,BA

ANSA- Acronym for American National Space Agency. It is one of many possible names for this organization that sent the three flights into space. Other possible names include: Allied Nations Space Agency and Associated Nations Space Agency. P,B,E,TV

BELLATRIX- Star in the constellation of Orion, approximately 320 light years away. This is was the destination of the Icarus 1, which Col. Taylor commanded. It was along this flight path that the ship ran into some sort of an anomaly and disappeared. P

BRENT, JOHN CHRISTOPHER- (JAMES FRANCISCUS) Lt., USAF. Was one of the crew members on the Icarus 2 rescue/re-con mission that was sent to look for Taylor's Icarus 1. Thirtyish, he survived a rather brutal crash-landing to eventually meet up with Nova, then Taylor in the mutant underground. After his escape along with Taylor and Nova, he was able to pick off a few mutants and gorillas before he is shot dead by gorilla troops when his rifle jammed right before Taylor set off the A-O device. B

BURKE, PETER- (JAMES NAUGHTON) One of the two surviving astronauts from the Icarus 4 along with Alan Viridon. He is more easy going than Viridon. He has accepted their situation and wants to make the best of it. Last seen going towards the Forbidden Zone along with Viridon and Galen, a chimpanzee that he and Viridon had befriended. TV

CAMP PENDLETON- Marine Corps base in Southern California where the Icarus 3 was taken for investigation and analysis. It is also where Zira and Cornelius are interrogated. E

CAPE CANAVERAL- Location in Southern Florida where ANSA's main space facility is located. This is where the three flights originated from. Also known as Cape Kennedy. P,B,TV

CORNELIUS, DR. (RODDY MC DOWELL & DAVID WATSON) A dedicated and visionary chimpanzee archaeologist and historian, husband of Zira and friend of Taylor and Brent. Escaped the destructive A-O blast along with Zira and Milo in a salvaged Icarus spacecraft back into time to father his own race's savior. Cornelius had made a few significant discoveries on the previous civilizations only to be quelled by Dr. Zaius. He was shot and killed by government police after he killed Dr. Hasslein, who earlier had killed Zira. P,B,E

CRYO-CHAMBER- Cryogenic sleeping chambers on the Icarus 1. They were used by the astronauts on the long interstellar voyage to Bellatrix. They were also used in conjunction with a metabolism reducing drug which slowed down the aging process along with the ship's computer, which monitored life support. P

DEAD LAKE- Large inland sea in the area where Long Island used to be. It is a briny, saltwater lake about the size of the Great Salt Lake. This is where the Icarus 1 crash-landed and sank in over 300 feet of water. P

DODGE, LT. (JEFF BURTON) African-American astronaut who survived the splashdown of the Icarus 1. A scholar, he would walk into a live volcano if he could learn something. He made the trip in search of knowledge. Dodge was shot and killed during the gorilla raid. He ended up stuffed and mounted in a museum because of his unique skin coloration. Dodge was science officer for the mission. P,B

DR. HASSLEIN'S THEORY OF TIME- According to Dr. Hasslein, in a vehicle travelling at close to the speed of light, Earth will age a few thousand years, while the astronauts on the vehicle will have hardly aged at all. P

EXTRATERRESTRIAL VIRUS- Also known as the plague. A radical and deadly strain brought back by one of the Icarus flights that ANSA had sent out. The ship itself had crash-landed on the coast of Hawaii, but before recovery teams could get to the wreckage, the virus had already escaped into the Earth's atmosphere. It spread across the planet in a few months, killing all or most domesticated animals, including dogs and cats. The reason for this has never been satisfactorily explained. The virus would eventually change the genetic make-up of most of the planet's species. It seemed at first that humans and apes were not affected. Combined with being bred by humans for intelligence and fallout from the nuclear war, the apes began to evolve rapidly, while the reverse can be said for the humans, though that process would take longer. An antidote was never found. The virus either died out or disappeared like the black plague. E,C

NOTE: Evidentially not all dogs and cats were killed off, because Viridon and Burke saw a few being kept by apes and a few humans during their journeys. TV

FORBIDDEN ZONE- A large stretch of desert expanse east of one of the ape cities. This is where Dead Lake is, and the crash sites of the first two Icarus spaceships. Cornelius mounted several expeditions there, and uncovered a more advanced past civilization. P,B,E,TV

FORT WAYNE- City in Indiana where George Taylor was raised. P

HANSON POINT- A location (probably in Florida) where Burke and Viridon trained while with ANSA. TV

HASSLEIN CURVE- A bend in the space-time continuum. Brent says to Skipper that they passed through one when they were looking for Taylor's ship. B

HASSLEIN, DR. OTTO- (ERIC BRAEDEN) Doctor of physics and scientific advisor to the President of the United States and one of the nation's most influential scientists. A brilliant, but ambitious man, he formulated the time theory and discovered the Hasslein Curve. A cold, calculating individual, he was of the opinion that the apes had destroyed humanity after interrogations of Zira and Cornelius and analysis of their salvaged spacecraft. He took matters into his own hands when he decided that the apes needed to be destroyed to preserve humanity, especially after learning that Zira was pregnant with the baby Milo. He was wrong of course, and was shot and killed by Cornelius after he had killed his wife Zira and what he assumed was the baby Milo. E

HOUSTON- City in Texas which is the home of Alan Viridon and ANSA's mission control center. TV

ICARUS- The name given to the class of lifting-body spacecraft used by ANSA for its space flights. There are three known classes of Icarus ships:

1. DEEP SPACE SLEEPER SHIP, 2. RESCUE/RECON SHIP, 3. SCOUT SHIP

NOTE: The name "Icarus" is not mentioned in any of the movies and TV show. It was named by a fan and somehow the name stuck. P,B,E,TV

ICARUS 4- The primary stage of a multi-stage deep space scout vessel. It was piloted by astronauts Viridon, Burke, and Jones. They were on their way to Alpha Centauri when they were hit by an intense flare from the Proxima red dwarf. This action, along with the ship's speed, catapulted them into the year 3085,

where they ended up on Earth. The ship was later vandalized by the apes, fearing what they couldn't understand. The ship was later buried to avoid further detection. TV

ICARUS 1- A deep space exploration vessel launched by ANSA on the first interstellar flight to the star Bellatrix. Astronauts Taylor, Dodge, Stewart, and Landon comprised the crew. This ship was a sleeper ship that was used on long interstellar missions such as this one. Due to some navigational/computer malfunction, the ship crash-landed on Earth in the year 3978, where it would eventually sink in an inland sea. P,B,E

ICARUS 3- The capsule ship from Escape. It is a conundrum in the mythos, and a lot of controversy surrounds it. This vessel transported Drs. Milo, Zira, and Cornelius from Earth of 3978, when the craft was hit by the shockwave blast from the A-O device. It was sent back to the year 1973, where it came down in the Eastern Pacific, off the Southern California coast. The ship was recovered and studied, and what it revealed would have serious implications for the whole planet. E

ICARUS 2- A similar, but smaller vessel than the Icarus 1. This was a rescue/re-con vessel that was sent out by ANSA to find out what happened to the first ship. The ship was crewed by astronauts Brent and "Skipper". They followed the same course that the Icarus 1 took, and also ended up on Earth in the year 3978, crashing up on the hard, desert floor of the Forbidden Zone. The aft end was totally destroyed. B

JACKSON COUNTY- County southwest of Houston, Texas where Alan Virdon was raised. TV

JEFFERSON PUBLIC SCHOOL- School in Fort Wayne, Indiana where Taylor was educated as a youth. P

JONES- (UNKNOWN) Third astronaut on the Icarus 4. Died of his injuries sustained in the crash. The apes later buried him. TV

LANDON, JOHN- (ROBERT GUNNER) Was ANSA's brightest boy, pride of the organization. Offered the chance to make the trek, he could not turn it down without tarnishing his image. He survived the crash-landing of the Icarus 1 only to be injured during the gorilla raid, and was later lobotomized by the apes under Dr. Zaius' orders. He became a mental vegetable. It is said that he also became a museum piece right along side Dodge. P,B

NOTE: "John" was the name given to Landon in the first script.

MILO, DR. - (SAL MINEO) Chimpanzee genius who found one of the crashed spacecraft and worked on it clandestinely with help from Zira and Cornelius, who believed in him. Milo also found books, papers, and other materials inside the ship, which helped him to figure out some of its workings. He somehow got it to work and into orbit with help from the A-O shock wave. He was able to pilot the craft on its re-entry, and discovered that they were some two thousand years in the past. He was killed by a primitive gorilla while in a holding cell in the Los Angeles Zoo. E

NEW JERSEY- State in the eastern United States. Peter Burke is from there. TV

7-14-1972- The date on the Icarus 1's ship time chronometer during Taylor's log entry. P

SKIPPER- (TOD ANDREWS) Real name unknown. Brent's commanding officer on the re-con mission. He dies of his injuries shortly after impact. Was married with two daughters. B

STEWART- (DIANNE STANLEY) Blond female astronaut on the Icarus 1. She dies in transit when her cryo-chamber malfunctioned which caused her to age very rapidly. She had been dead nearly a year at splashdown. P

SW CALIFORNIA- Location of the Icarus 4's crash site. TV

TAYLOR, COLONEL GEORGE- (CHARLTON HESTON) Colonel, USAF. Ship and mission commander. He is a misanthropic man, bored with life on Earth, bored with people, contemptuous of humanity. He is an idealist who has this fixation that somewhere in the universe there must be some creature that is superior to man. He became the only survivor of the Icarus 1 to wreak havoc among the apes and mutants. He made a lot of friends and enemies during his brief stay on the POTA. Friends included Zira, Cornelius, Lucius, and Nova. Enemies included Dr. Zaius, who had always dreaded man's return and was scared of Taylor and deemed him a threat to ape civilization. From Fort Wayne, Indiana, Taylor took the mission to find that "superior" creature and to get away from the Earth. ANSA offered him the mission because of his prior space flight and leadership experience. A cynic and a pessimist, he wasn't really surprised that mankind destroyed itself after the shock realizing he was back on Earth wore off,

and after meeting up with Brent in the mutant underground, he would eventually detonate the Alpha-Omega nuclear device not only to end the ape-mutant war, but put an end to everything. P,B,E

TAYLOR'S TRAJECTORY- The name that Brent gives to the Icarus 1's course that they followed. B

3955- The commonly mentioned year that is the wrong year. Brent must have read the wrong panel, or still was shaken up from the impact. He told Skipper where they were, and Zira was drunk from Dr. Hasslein when she mentioned it. B,E

3-21-3085- Date on which the Icarus 4 crash-landed on Earth. TV

3-23-27-2673- Dates on the Icarus 1's Earth time chronometer which changes during Taylor's log entry. P

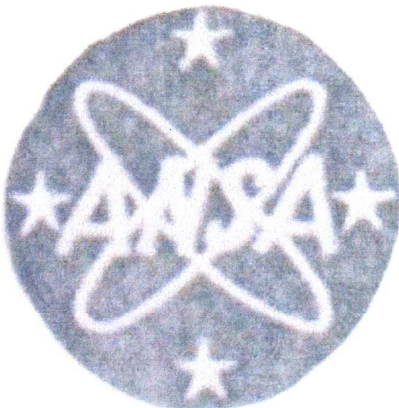
3-25-3978- Date on which the Icarus 1 crashes-lands on Earth. P

TX-9- A piece of equipment that is part of astronauts survival pack. Taylor mentions it when he is doing an inventory of their supplies. Its description and purpose is unknown. P

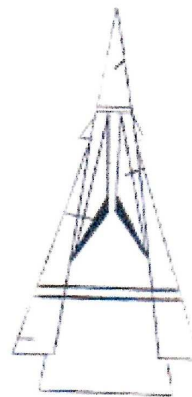
VIRDON, COMMANDER ALAN- (RON HARPER) Commander, USN. The commander of the Icarus 4. Not as easy going as Peter Burke, Viridon is trying to make sense on what he thinks is an upside down, screwed up world. He has one purpose in mind: to return to his proper home in time and space, and to his wife and son, Chris. Was last seen going towards the Forbidden Zone with Burke and Galen. TV

ZIRA, DR.-(KIM HUNTER) A chimpanzee psychiatrist and veterinarian. Wife of Cornelius, and eventually mother of Milo/Caesar. She is the first to discover that Taylor is more than he seems, and eventually befriends him. She, along with Cornelius, helps Milo salvage one of the wrecked spacecraft and finds herself, along with them, two thousand years in the past, where she gives birth to Milo, and is killed by Dr. Hasslein. P,B,E,BA

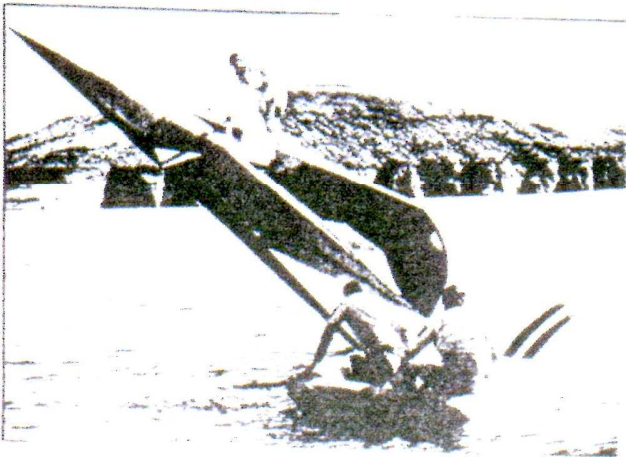

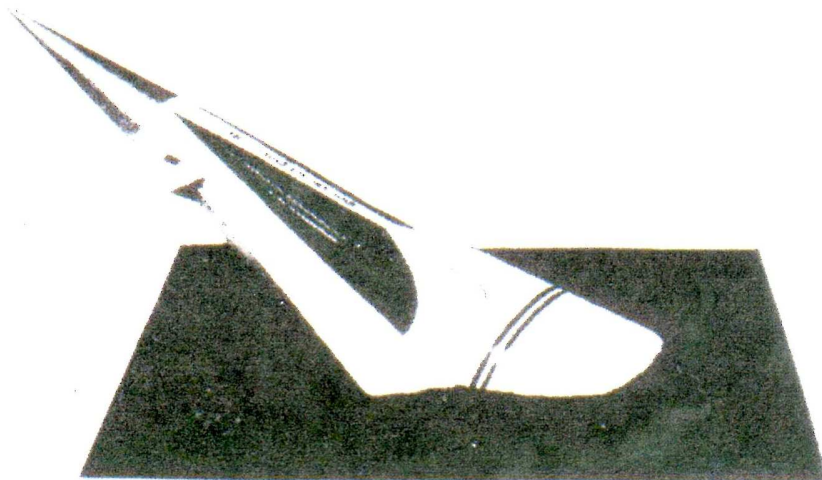
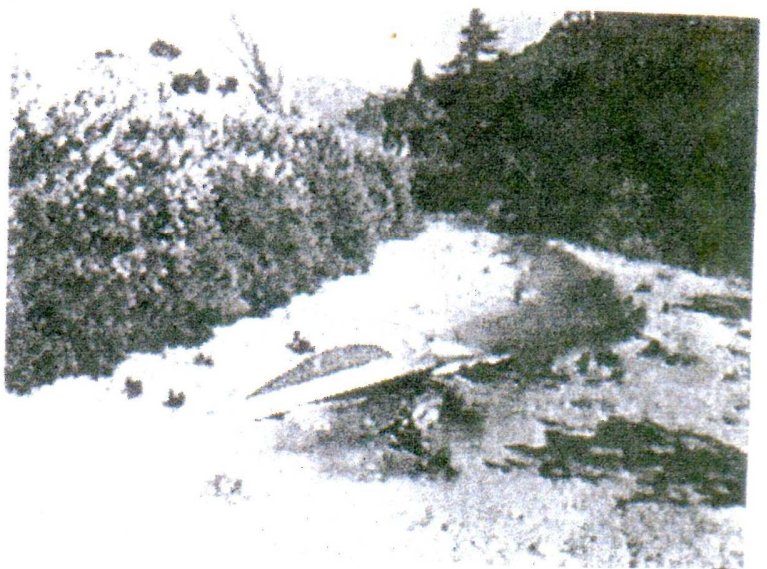

A BRIEF CHRONOLOGICAL HISTORY OF THE ANSA FLIGHTS FROM THE POTA TIMELINE by Roger Hansen

1972

February

Astronauts Taylor, Dodge, Landon and Stewart are launched on the first interstellar exploration flight. Their destination is the star Bellatrix, in the constellation of Orion.

November

Astronauts Brent and "Skipper" are launched along the same flight path as the previous vessel to probe its unexplained disappearance from detection.

1973

April

An ANSA spacecraft reappears mysteriously in nearby space. It lands off the Southern California coast, slightly north of San Clemente and is met by mobilized US Navy spaceflight recovery crews. The ship is found to be piloted by three speaking chimpanzees who identify themselves as Doctors Cornelius, Zira, and Milo. The apes are taken to the Los Angeles Zoo, where Milo is killed by a primitive gorilla. Cornelius and Zira are brought before a scientific inquiry and are accepted as friends of the planet Earth. The spacecraft is then transported to Camp Pendleton marine corps base for further study.

June

Through underhanded interrogation and analysis of the spacecraft, Dr. Otto Hasslein learns of the ultimate fate of the human race and the planet Earth. He convinces the President that the apes are a threat to humankind. Cornelius and Zira are taken to Camp Pendleton for further interrogation. After escaping, they flee to a circus where Zira, now pregnant, gives birth to the baby Milo. Shortly thereafter, Zira and Cornelius are killed by Dr. Hasslein and government police. The baby Milo is put under the care of Armando, the owner of the circus. Dr. Hasslein himself was shot and killed by Cornelius.

1981

March

Astronauts Virdon, Burke and Jones are launched from Earth towards Alpha Centauri. Their ship encounters an ion storm coming from the Proxima red dwarf and disappears.

1982

May

An ANSA spacecraft crashes off the coast of Hawaii. Recovery teams arrive and rescue the astronauts and retrieve the wreckage. What is not known at the time is that the ship has brought back an extraterrestrial virus; which will spread across the planet in a few months, killing off most domestic animals and altering the genetic make-up of most of the planet's species. The ship was taken to one of ANSA's crash facilities where it was quarantined and where only people with a top security

clearance were allowed to view and study the ship and its contents.

3085

June

Astronauts Alan Virdon and Peter Burke crash-land but survive (unlike Jones) in the region of the US that was once SW California. The ship was later vandalized by the apes for fearing what they couldn't understand. The ship was later buried to avoid further detection. Virdon and Burke were last seen going towards the Forbidden Zone to find a computer to play back their flight log and hope to find a way back home.

3978

March

The spacecraft containing three surviving males (Taylor, Dodge and Landon), along with one dead female (Stewart), crash-lands in an inland sea somewhere in the area of what was Long Island. Landmasses have shifted so that is no longer ocean. The ship sinks in over 300ft of water. The astronauts journey across the barren desert to a forested area where they come across primitive humans. In a gorilla raid, Dodge is killed and Taylor and Landon are captured but are separated. After discovering the situation that he is in, Taylor discovers that Landon has become a mental vegetable after undergoing brain surgery. With help from a couple of chimpanzees Zira and Cornelius, Taylor goes into the Forbidden Zone only to find out he is back on Earth.

July

Cornelius and Zira have been aiding the genius chimpanzee Dr. Milo in his studies of one of the salvaged spacecraft. He is analyzing it and attempting to ready it for flight.

September

Brent's ship crash-lands in the Forbidden Zone not far from the inland sea where Taylor's ship went down. "Skipper" dies of his injuries shortly thereafter. He eventually meets up with Taylor in the mutant underground where he is killed by gorillas. Taylor is also killed by gorillas but not before he detonates the Alpha-Omega bomb, putting an end to everything.

At the same time, Milo, Cornelius and Zira have somehow got their ship into space, thanks to the Alpha-Omega shockwave. They will eventually turn up on Earth in 1973.

NOTES

1. Stewart dies when her cryo-chamber malfunctions.
2. Dodge eventually ends up as a museum piece. The same can be said for Landon as well.
3. Contrary to what is said in the movies, the third ship is clearly not Taylor's or Brent's by its shortened and physical appearance.
4. The year 3955 is wrong. 3978 has been generally accepted as the year in question.
5. Jones is taken away and buried by the apes.

CLEOPATRA: THE MYSTIQUE IS BACK! **by Thomas C. Bailey (edited by Terry Hoknes)**

Cleopatra's aura of fascination, intrigue and royalty are coming back with a vengeance.

Last year **Roddy McDowall** died of cancer. One of his pre-ape efforts was the 20th Century Fox biopic of Cleopatra.

Cleopatra is back in full force this May, according to the review in People Magazine (May 14 1999). This movie is livelier than the 1963 version most remembered by everyone in film. This film is produced by **Robert Salmi, Jr** and directed by **Frank Raddom**.

The main source this movie is based on is the Memoirs Of Cleopatra by **Margaret George**. She did research for 10 years correcting the myths surrounding Cleopatra one of them being a sex-kitten. According to Ms. George she was more than that. Business woman, politician and great ruler. Cleopatra was surrounded by powerful men. This writer skimmed through the 1997 book.

On the talk show circuit, **Catherine Zeta-Jones** (The Phantom, Entrapment) has an interesting comment: "men of power and stature" Ms. Zeta-Jones refers to **Antonio Banderas** (the mask of Zorro) and **Sean Connery** (James Bond films).

What does this have to do with Cleopatra? At the time of the Roman Empire, power was what based on the wants of ambitious people.

This brings me to the crux of this review. **Roddy McDowall** played the rival Roman Caesar, Octavian, in the 1963 version. Now there is **Rupert Graves**. Rupert Graves, Octavian, is very low key and not as maniacal as the performance Roddy McDowall made in the 1963. Actually **McDowall** looks more like a fiercer version of William Katt (Greatest American Hero, Perry Mason). Roddy wears a very curly blonde wig.

The first half could be compared to another film about Cleopatra. It was Caesar and Cleopatra (1946 UK) with **Claude Rains** (The Lost World) and **Vivien Leigh** (Gone With The Wind) based on the play by **George Bernard Shaw**. One reason is the age difference between Caesar (Dalton) and Cleopatra, the Chilean born actress, **Leonor Varela**.

Leonor Varela is part of a long line of actresses who portrayed the Queen of the Nile: **Theda Bara** 1917 no copies survive on film. **Claudette Colbert** 1934 The flapper Cleopatra. **Vivien Leigh** 1946 British - the young learner. **Elizabeth Taylor** 1963 literally the Grand Dame. **Sophia Loren**, **Sara Bernhard** and possibly **Bertila Damas** have done Cleopatra on stage.

The only thing about **Leonor Varela**, among with other cast members is everyone is young and healthy. Ms Varela is almost too young to play the part. Historical accounts report Cleopatra lived to the ripe age of middle age.

Timothy Dalton best known as the 4th James Bond as well as the Post-Star Wars film Flash Gordon (1980) as Prince Barin with vet British actor **Brian Blessed** (Star Wars Phantom Menace as Boss Nass, and Space 1999) plays Julius Caesar as a very robust and healthy individual.

Timothy Dalton's Caesar looks and sounds as if he got up on the wrong side of the bed. Possibly pumped on steroids, although Dalton's body is lean and mean!

There is not a gray hair on his head. Like **Rex Harrison**, he is British, but lacks the patience and restraint.

When Caesar dies, he goes down fighting. This Caesar is rowdy when he goes.

This movie does not follow **William Shakespeare's** Julius Caesar. Most of the Caesar's (**Rex Harrison**, **Louis Calhern**, **Sir John Gielgud**) went out with some form of dignity. Dalton's Caesar goes down several times before he dies. You can't keep a good soldier down.

Rex Harrison's Julius Caesar is really a monarch in the first half of this long epic. Mr. Harrison would later work for **Arthur P. Jacobs** in Dr. Doolittle.

Most sci-fi fans would be very familiar with his son, **Noel Harrison**. Noel with **Stephanie Powers** (April Dancer) as the U.N.C.L.E. team from the spin-off series The Girl From U.N.C.L.E.

Rex Harrison plays Julius Caesar with dignity, charm and some wit. Compared to the **Claudette Colbert** version with **Warren Williams** (1934) Caesar coming off more like a business man.

Rex plays Caesar like a politician and Royal King. Of course, history paints Julius Caesar as an Anti-Christ type of figure. (Rev 13:1-18)

Rex Harrison was best known for another film with Audrey Hepburn. It was My Fair Lady.

This film was best known for the relationship between **Richard Burton** and **Elizabeth Taylor**. It was talk of conversation and lots of gossip. Their whirlwind romance, courtship (sort of) and marriage.

Liz Taylor's Cleopatra is happy nice one minute and very angry the next. Unlike **Claudette Colbert's** Cleopatra, she played her character with humor and some perkiness.

Throughout the earlier version **Claudette Colbert** laughs her through the film, until the kingdom falls apart.

Roddy McDowall plays a real life character named Octavian. A real ad guy if ever there was one. In real life, Octavian was a rival for Caesar's throne. He expressed dismay Marc Antony lost his Roman stature as a soldier. Marc Antony and Cleopatra neither liked Octavian either. In this movie Roddy McDowall is

the Heavy, make no doubt about it. **McDowall** went from the heavy, Octavian to the familiar chimps Cornelius and yes! Caesar!!

Liz Taylor's Cleopatra (1963) is a politician too. She is shrewd, mean, and has savvy.

In the latest documentaries, Cleopatra, Julius Caesar, and Marc Antony wanted a New World Order. Julius Caesar succeeded with several Caesars to follow. Marc Antony and Cleopatra did not.

As for the film itself as stated earlier it nearly killed Fox. When **Roddy McDowall** came back to play in the first POTA film, he may not have realized how the Fox studio was saved. **Darryl and Richard Zanuck** were under real pressure. Since they made a whole bunch of musicals including Hello Dolly(**Barbara Streisand**), Star (**Julie Andrews**) and Dr. Doolittle, the musicals almost ruined Fox too! It is fortunate the Zanucks picked up the POTA property of **Pierre Boule**.

One of the highlights of the Cleopatra remake were the other stars. **Martin Landau** (Mission Impossible, Space 1999 and Ed Wood) British actor **Andrew Kerr** (The Quartermass SF films for Hammer), **Hume Cronyn** (Cocoon 1 and 2), and **Caesar Danova**, one of the choices for the earlier Ben-Hur.

Biopics have always been with us. Now they are called docudramas. Cleopatra is again going to be a docudrama with another actress filling her sandals.

Lori Valora is the newest one to come. **Billy Zane** (The Phantom, Titanic) is the latest Marc Antony.

Catherine Zeta-Jones: This woman could possibly play the Queen of the Nile in the near future. Lately there has been a change in how historians and filmmakers view the Queen as being "white". Varela is dark-olive skinned, so too is **Catherine Zeta-Jones** and **Bertila Damas**. Cleopatra is a middle-eastern woman.

The Zane-Varela romance: **Billy Zane** had shoes to fill when he accepted the part of Marc Antony. It looked like he was reading Shakespeare cold! Zane and Varela had an "affair of sorts" it was not as wild as Taylor and Burtons.

On a recent broadcast of the The View(WB-21), **Billy Zane** and **Leonor Varela** appeared as a couple.

In the 90's everything is fast and furious. The legend of Cleopatra and Julius Caesar continue. Xena: Warrior Princess and Hercules: Legendary Journey have expanded on the legend, to a point. Xena in one episode portrays Cleopatra as Black. Egypt, however, looks too much like New Zealand.

Julius Caesar: Caesar as portrayed by **Kurt Urban**. For some reason this Roman is more Vulcan than he should be. He has the Roman hair cut, sure! Then there are the slanted eye brows. Thankfully the ears are not pointed. In both Xena and Hercules,

Julius Caesar is a heavy, a TV heavy, matching wits with a very mythic Xena and Hercules. In the series he never meets Cleopatra.

Extra comments:

Octavian: This man was ambitious and ruthless to the core. After Cleopatra died, he mercilessly killed Caesar's son, Caesarean. He ruled the throne for 45 years. A real nice guy!

Other Caesars: Tiberius (the Caesar of Christ's time), Caligua (the spaced out nut),

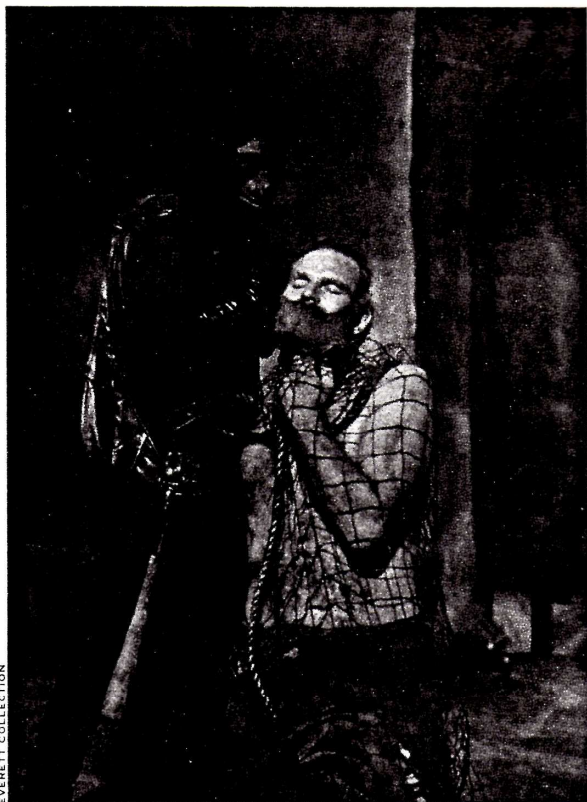

Monkeyshines

No joke: 'Planet of the Apes' teems with political subtexts

WHILE WATCHING *Beneath the Planet of the Apes*, you probably never analyzed the gorilla army's march into the Forbidden Zone. Eric Greene has—it's clearly a metaphor for America's incursion into Vietnam, right? Greene's **'PLANET OF THE APES' AS AMERICAN MYTH** (McFarland, \$29.95) sounds like one of those irony-steeped college courses, but it's hardly monkey business. To him, the *Apes* movie series wasn't merely five goofy-scary sci-fi flicks about life before and after the apocalypse. Instead, they were increasingly politicized manifestos about America during the turbulent late '60s and early '70s. And what's even scarier than Charlton Heston in a loin-cloth is that Greene makes an utterly plausible case for his theory.

For instance, Greene, a Los Angeles writer, feels it was no coincidence that Heston, "a film icon of white heroic strength and Western indomitability," starred in the first film as the cynical astronaut Col. George Taylor. For a country tarnished by Asian conflicts and violent assassinations, Taylor's mauling by the apes symbolized America's fall from

grace. In *Escape*, Greene sees the quashing of pacifist chimps Zira and Cornelius as a metaphor for the suppression of the Left by the Man. He even finds meaning in the limp final installments, *Conquest* and *Battle*: In his eyes, those violent, militaristic flicks symbolize the rise of the black-liberation movement and the resultant anxieties of white liberals. How's *them* bananas? Feel free to harrumph like Dr. Zaius, but Greene supports his arguments in interviews with the creators, who confirm some of these messages. He also hit the "pause" (or "paws"?) button enough to pick up such fleeting images as a dead African-American with a rope around his neck (in *Conquest*). Greene's academic yet readable prose occasionally overheats, as when he strains to find segregation associations in the use of a school bus in *Battle*, when it could simply be, you know, a *bus*. But after 187 well-considered pages, you'll be scratching your head in humbled agreement. **B+** —David Browne

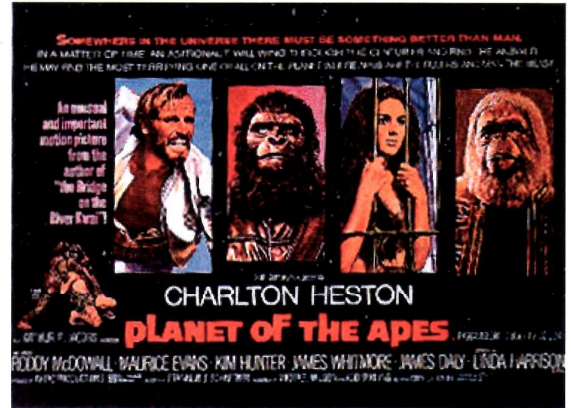

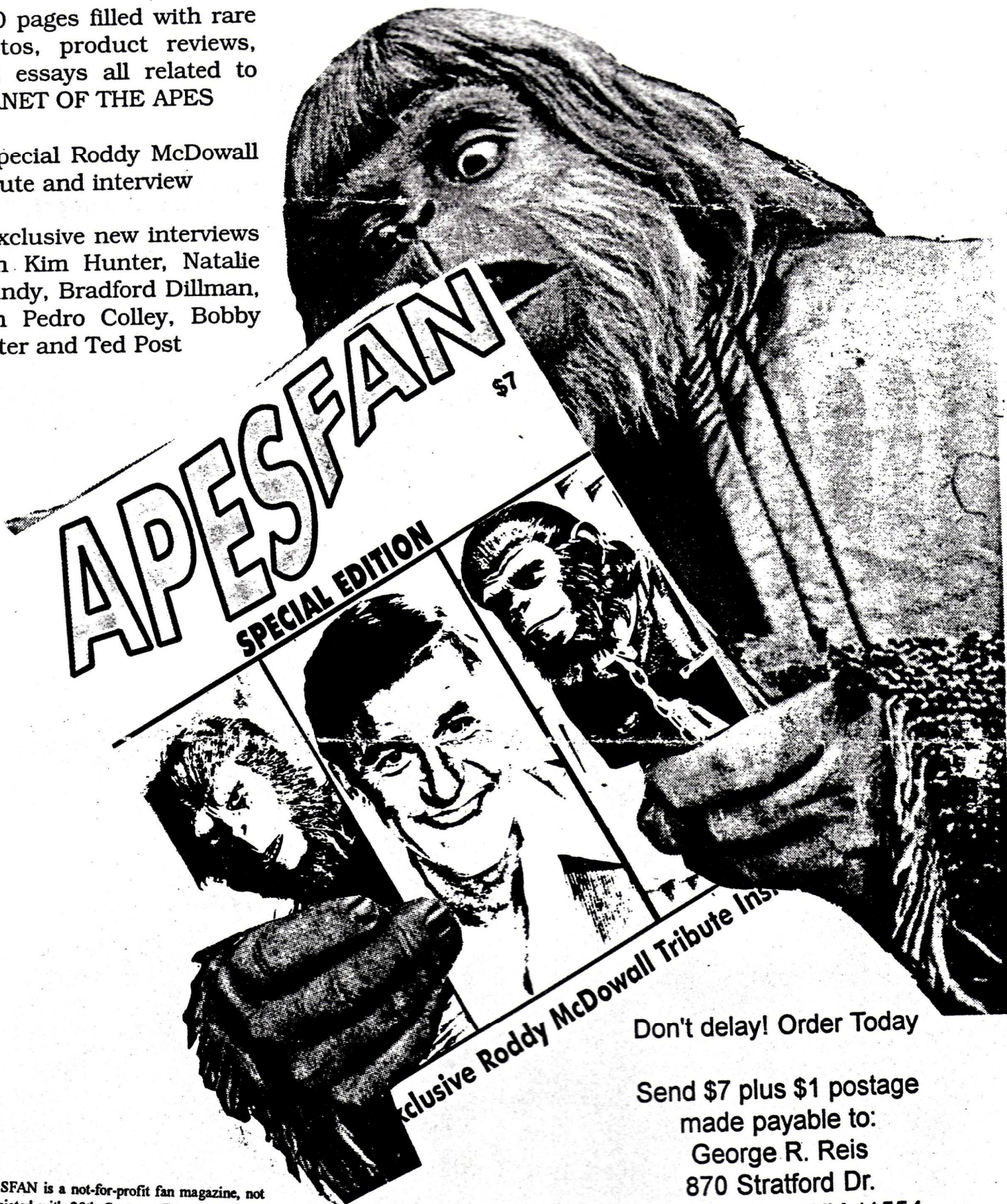

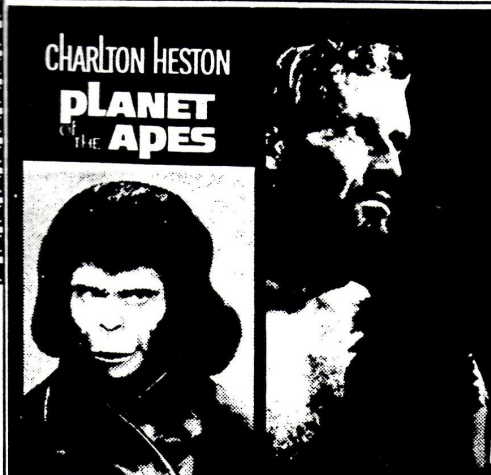

Sixties science fiction didn't get much better than *Planet of the Apes*. Anchored by the larger-than-life Heston, the epic adventure was lavishly produced on a big scale, in a style somewhere between reality and dream. Actually, make that *nightmare*, as astronaut Taylor (Heston) awakens from suspended animation to find himself hunted, shot and repeatedly humiliated in a world he cannot escape, a civilization where apes dominate and all humans are dumb animals. Michael Wilson and Rod Serling crafted a magnificently fresh and original script from Pierre Boulle's best-selling novel, sparking the imagination and reflecting the era's social unrest. When *Planet's* success mandated a continuation, writer Paul Dehn (well-regarded for his work on *Goldfinger*, the third Bond outing) was brought in to guide the franchise, providing dramatic contributions up through *Battle*. *Beneath the Planet of the Apes* is an accurate title, as fellow star voyager Franciscus, searching for the missing Taylor, stumbles onto an underground enclave of human mutants. *Escape From the Planet of the Apes* is the most dated of the bunch, set in a budget-friendly contemporary Los Angeles in all its garishness, rooting the saga from that point on in more or less modern day. It also shifted the focus from the human protagonists



to the apes (McDowall, Hunter and Mineo), who suddenly became the "fish out of water" in this strange time and place. *Conquest of the Planet of the Apes* attempted to explain the "origin" of the Planet, sowing the seeds of the new evolution, culminating in a bloody third act that had to be re-edited due to its shocking intensity. And it paved the way for *Battle For the Planet of the Apes*, detailing a final attempt to overthrow the hirsute masters and the closest thing to a "feel-good" *Apes* movie, as humans and simians have learned to work together some years after Caesar's *Conquest*. Despite some oddly amusing moments, as when mutant France Nuyen tries to cover a radiation scar with makeup, the story is heavy-handed in its call for interspecies (can you say "interracial"?) tolerance. Ironically, this most open-ended tale of the quintet would be the final installment.

Both the set and individual cassettes offer clean, crisp new THX-certified editions of all five films. I strongly recommend the widescreen versions (sold as a VHS collection, with the original *Planet of the Apes* available alone at \$19.98, or even better as individual Image laserdiscs at \$34.98 each), as all boldly exploit the big 2.35:1 Cinemascope frame. We also have the option to send away for a brand-new "making of" documentary cassette, *Behind the Planet of the Apes*. All the details are there, such as why a seasoned Thespian like the late McDowall would endure that makeup and risk the ape-boy label for the rest of his career. (It was the acting challenge, which he met all too well.) But the highlight is definitely the original screen test of legendary Edward G. Robinson as orangutan patriarch Dr. Zaius, previously a favorite bootleg clip on the underground circuit. In fact, the only negative thing about these new tapes/discs is the package, which obviously assumes prior viewing as it gives away probably the greatest surprise ending in Hollywood history. Yes, this long-overdue set is the cornerstone of any proper fantasy-film library, affording devotees the freedom to show any title in any order—much easier on the buttocks than the "Go Ape!" theatrical movie marathon of the mid-70s. ♂

The Phantom's BIG APES A GO-GO! (Warner, \$19.98 each) 12/98

Keyed to the Mighty Joe Young remake's 12/98 big-screen release, Warner reissues a quartet of gorilla classics:

KING KONG (1933) B&W ♂♂♂♂

The titular supersimian's affections for fragile Fay lead to his imprisonment, abortive showbiz career and literal downfall in one of Hollywood's truly towering achievements, crammed with powerful iconic imagery, breakthrough special effects (courtesy of FX pioneer Willis O'Brien) and seat-squirming scares galore. Beware the computer-colored version, still out there on the Turner label.

SON OF KONG (1933) B&W ♂♂♂ 1/2

D: Ernest B. Schoedsack. Robert Armstrong, Helen Mack, Victor Wong. 70 mins.

Showman Carl Denham (a returning Armstrong) flees his creditors and hies to Skull Island, where he encounters Kong Jr. (though mater remains a mystery; he bears no resemblance to Fay Wray). A shockingly cheesy followup for its time, generously padded with footage lifted from the first feature, *Son* set a bad sequel precedent for decades to come. Still fun going, though, with Schoedsack and crew emphasizing humor and pathos over thrills.

MIGHTY JOE YOUNG (1949)

B&W ♂♂♂

D: Ernest B. Schoedsack. Terry Moore, Ben Johnson, Robert Armstrong. 94 mins.

A kinder, gentler *King Kong* variation for a postwar era that had had its fill of horror (at least temporarily), *Mighty Joe Young* is closer in spirit to *National Velvet*, a girl-and-her-gorilla story played for warmth and pathos (and a few thrills), with teenette Moore and the titular simian softie (billed in the credits as "Mr. Joseph Young!") rending steel bars and viewers' hearts with equal aplomb. While scaled down, the Oscar-winning effects are excellent, thanks to old hand O'Brien and newcomer Ray Harryhausen. The animated *The Mighty Kong* completes Warner's furry foursome. ♂

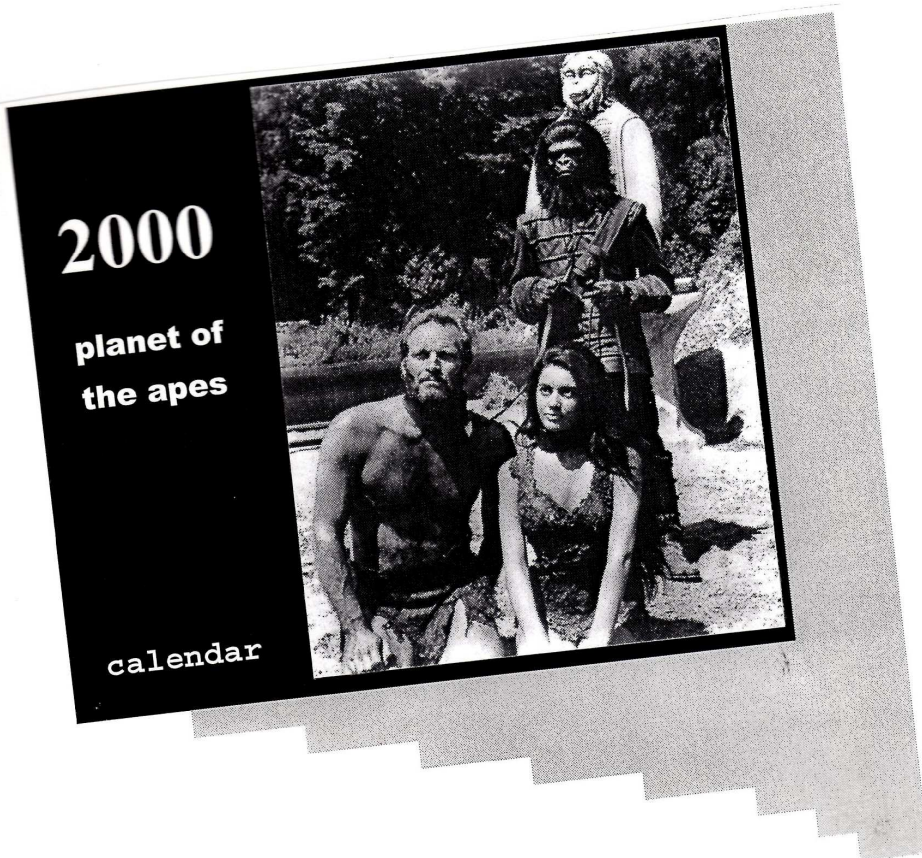
