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#### PLANET OF THE APES

THE GLADIATORS - by Art Wallace

The loss of a magnetic disc that will transfer them back to their own time causes BURKE and VIRDON to become involved with gladiators.

With Gorilla-leader URKO still sending patrols out in search of them, Astronauts VIRDON and BURKE rest briefly in a wooded area while their Chimp friend, GALEN, brings them a strange fruit. Eating, Virdon fondles the magnetic metal disc that's his only link with the world he knew. If he could but find a computer it would fit, he might reverse its direction past the time warp that plunged Burke and him into a world where Gorillas are masters and the humans fugitives and slaves. Burke has no such hope - what computer, where is it? Virdon has no answer, only a determination to keep searching. Moments later, they hear sounds of a struggle nearby and creep through the brush until they see a pair of humans, burly glants, locked in mortal combat. When one, DALTON, is downed by the other, TOLAR, Burke rushes to keep Tolar from attacking anew. Then the two of them fight until Virdon and Galen hear a horse approaching and sound a warning. Hiding; the astronauts see an authoritative chimp, BARLOW, ride up and ask Tolar how he and Dalton are coming with the training - they're gladiators. Too late, Virdon finds he's lost the magnetic disc; Barlow has picked it up and pocketed(it. Virdon says he has to get it back somehow; it's hope of home to him. Burke, much less believing, nevertheless agrees to help him. Meanwhile, a patrol, led by a Gorilla lieutenant, JASON, is half-a-day behind on their trail... Following Barlow's tracks, the astronauts and Galen come to a settlement that has an amphitheater, a stable for horses and a house - Barlow's. Galen volunteers to approach Barlow - after all, they're both Chimps. He represents himself as a scientist, says he's been thrown by his horse. Barlow, with a small garrison of Gorillas, heads a village of humans and is somewhat bored. Galen looks like a diversion, especially when he spots the disc on the desk and discourses learnedly on artifacts. But he can't get his hands on the disc. At the same time Burke and Virdon, trying to steal horses, are discovered and imprisoned in a cage. What the purpose of this is Galen soon discovers when the villagers gather in the amphitheater and Barlow takes him along to witness a contest. It was to have been between Tolar and Dalton, who are father and son, but the youth has no stomach for the gladiatorial ring and a substitute has to be provided - Burke. The astronaut is no match

for the giant Tolar until he remembers judo and quickly wears him down. Then he finds he's supposed to dispatch his vanquished opponent with a sword. This, Barlow explains, is how he satisfies his human villagers' blood lust. It keeps them peaceful and happy. Burke cannot bring himself to kill Tolar and soon enough he needs the sword to hurl at one of Jason's Gorillas - the Patrol has just arrived. Burke and Galen manage to flee to Tolar's house in the woods, sure he will help rescue Virdon in return for Burke's sparing his life. But Tolar is far from grateful - Burke's act disgraced him, destroyed his manhood. He will not help. Barlow, mbanwhile, has persuaded Jason to stay and watch how successfully he handles humans. He arranges another match - between Dalton and the friend of the man who disgraced his father - Virdon. But Dalton doesn't believe in Barlow's blood-lust theory, refuses to fight and is jailed with Virdon. Tolar, outraged at that, brushes guards aside like ants, releases the prisoners and grapples with Jason, who, armed, would kill him. Both die in the battle to the satisfaction of the villagers. But Barlow is a changed man - he gives the disc to Galen and, telling Dalton he need fight no more, looks the other way as the Astronauts and Chimp escape...

# TWO HUMANS CAPTURED: ONE SPEAKS

The light leak was discovered several days ago. Now, after a major calamity, it has finally been repaired.




### Sins of the Father #1


General disagrees and grabs the human and tells him to admit what he has done. To everyones surprise he speaks and says "Yes".

Another exciting issue. Shall we move on to the next?


### Blood of the Apes #3


I wish I could thank all of rest of you who sent letters and continued to support us in any way throughout the last two years. You have all been fantastic!
