THE GORILLAS---Part II

A war broke out in "Beneath The Planet of the Apes", but the gorillas themselves provoked it. The chimpanzees protested the war, but the orangutans wanted to invade for scientific reasons and since they held the power, the invasion proceeded. The film introduced the first gorilla of major importance, General Ursus, who even did a nude scene. Machine guns popped up in the final scene of the film, which was probably the most FINAL "final scene" of any movie.

Gorillas did not appear in the third entry, "Escape from the Planet of the Apes," except briefly in some flashbacks (just stock footage from the first picture), but the producers made it up to the gorilla buffs by filling the screen with them in film number four, "Conquest of the Planet of the Apes." Hundreds of studio extras slipped into red coveralls and pulled gorilla masks over their heads for further monkeyshines on the Fox lot. No important gorillas cropped up and little was shown to further our knowledge of them except more examples of their belligerence and inferior minds.

"Battle for the Planet of the Apes" introduced the second important gorilla, General Aldo, who did more to lower the status of gorilla-kind than any other of his species. Aldo epitomizes the ultimate in undesirable Ape characteristics. He even breaks their most sacred law: "Ape shall never kill Ape". With his death at the movie's climax, we are led to suspect that the gorillas have finally "seen the light".

Few changes were made in the gorillas when "Planet of the Apes" became a weekly television series. The series introduced the third great gorilla, General Urko. The gorilla in "Beneath" was "Ursus" which is the Latin word for "Bear". The producers planned for Ursus to be a TV character, but decided that "Bear" was a ludicrous name for a gorilla and changed it to "Urko". They are the same character, but I personally don't consider them as such. Ursus was portrayed by James Gregory, who is known for his numerous "Matt Helm" films (with Dean Martin). While Gregory is a good actor, he has little talent when compared to Mark Lenard (Urko). Lenard played Spock's father on "Star Trek", and was a regular on "Here Comes The Brides." Born of Russian parents, the powerful voiced Lenard is perfect for the part of the giant brute/policeman/general. Galloping through the lush countryside on his white stallion, Urko did much to restore the status of the gorillas, which was lost under Aldo.


Because their general stupidity makes them unsuited for other work, the gorillas have the menial tasks to perform. This both frees the other Apes for more important work, and it satisfies the gorillas' primitive bloodlust.

Perhaps the most important function of the gorillas is not generally evident. Examine pictures of modern day (1975) gorillas, orangutans, and chimpanzees, and then compare these with the pictures of the "Planet" simians. While the changes in orangutans and chimps are bizarre beyond reality, the gorillas remain almost intact. Thus the primary function of the gorillas is to provide the Planet of the Apes with some much needed believability.

INTERVIEW WITH THE APES (PART TWO, OF A MEETING WITH ZIRA & CORNELIUS)

Following questions asked by members of audience attending the recent visit of Zira and Cornelius to Albany, N.Y. Questions and answers are not direct quotes but are as close to actual dialog as possible.

Little Boy: "Who are ya?" ZIRA: "Who am I? Why my name is Zira and this is my husband Cornelius."

Ques.: "What are your real names? What do you do in movies?" ZIRA: "My name is Paula Crist, I'm an actress & stunt woman. Cornelius' name is Bill Blake, he's an actor & was a make-up man in Philadelphia for CBS-TV."

Little Girl: "How come ya got two sets of teeth?" ZIRA(laughing): "That's because I'm wearing ape make-up, apes have teeth, people have teeth so I have two sets!" Ques.: "Are those real ape clothes?" CORNELIUS: "Yes, this is the costume worn by Roddy McDowall in Planet of the Apes, Escape From The Planet of the Apes, Battle for The Planet of the Apes and as Galen in the TV show. Paula is wearing the costume worn by Kim Hunter in "Planet" and "Escape" and "Beastie" the Planet of the Apes" (Zira added that she is just Kim's height (5 feet 1 inch) and size, just as Bill is the same size & height (5'8") as Roddy).

Ques: "How come the Apes could talk?" CORNELIUS: "Apes are very intelligent, "OUR" son, Ceasar taught the other apes to speak. Do I think apes will ever learn to talk, really? I'm not sure, but there are scientists who have taught a chimp to use deaf-mute sign language. She can "talk" to them just as clearly as if she could speak." (Reporters note: NET-TV's NOVA series recently did a show called "The First Signs of Washoe" about this amazing chimp. Washoe not only can communicate with humans around her, but apparently thinks and reasons in the same way humans do, she is about six years old and is as intelligent as a deaf/mute child the same age. Most deaf/mute children learn faster than normal kids.)

Ques: "What do your letters mean?" ZIRA(trying to figure out what was meant, finally looking down at the symbols on her leather collar): "Oh, my hieroglyphs! This [] means a Doctorate, only a doctor may wear this sign. This [] has a Biblical meaning but I don't remember it now."

Ques: "How do ya fall off a horse?" PAULA: "It takes a lot of practice, cooperation between horse & rider. A horse must also learn how to take a fall."

Ques: "What is the make-up made of?" ZIRA/PAULA: "A special foam rubber formula now being used by surgeons to restore portions of the human body removed during surgery, such as a carcinoma(cancer) of the face. (Note: the following are a few of the imaginative, interesting querys asked by P.O.T.A.-member Jeff Teolis)

J.T.: "Do you do your own makeup if not, who does/did he do makeup for the films?"

Ans.: "We put on our make-up which Bill makes fresh each night at our hotel, he pumps the foam into molds of our faces & the mask, then lets them bake over night in a little oven he carries with him. It takes 3 to 4 hours to put on, we wear it about 12 hours (Roddy has worn his as long as 20 hrs at a time), it takes me (Paula) about 1 hr. to take it off. Bill doesn't take so long to get his off but he takes longer to put it on in the morning (and they talk about us women hogging the mirror while putting on our faces!)"

J.T.: "Were you in the Ape movies? What other films have you done?" (to Paula)

Ans.: "Yes, I played a chimp & a human in "Battle". Remember toward the end they show the people in the corral, a closeup of a little girl with her mother? I was the mother! I'm traped in a glass elevator (in black wig & dark make up) in "The Towering Inferno". Crushed to death, but saved in a second role by George Kennedy & Charlton Heston in "Earthquake". I was also a student on Room 222 the last season. Bill wasn't in the "Apes" movies but he did makeup work for "Battle" and the TV show. He played a chimp in the episode "The Interrogation". (and so went a great interview with two great apes!)

J.T.: "Why didn't we ever see any girl gorillas in any of the movies or on TV?"
Ans.: "Um, I've never been asked that one before! There were to be lady gorillas in "Planet" but we only had a 5 million dollar budget, so by the time the sets, costumes and of course the makeup was designed there wasn't enough for other apes other than chimps, orangutans and male gorillas, the girl gorillas had to be written out. The director of "Conquest" didn't like female gorillas so he had them written out, but there were lady orangutans. I don't know why there were none in "Battle"."

J.T.: "What's the most dangerous stunt you've ever done?" (to Paula)

Ans.: "Being hit by a truck!!!"

J.T.: "What was it like working on Battle For the Planet of the Apes?"

ZIRA: "It was great fun, being a stuntwoman, I spent most of my time with the stunt men sipping chocolate milk shakes. I also spent time with Paul Williams, who played Virgil. He's only about my height and says he hates anyone taller than he is (which means he hates most of the people in the world). Really, Paul is a brilliant, talented and funny person. Roddy McDowall is great to work with, he is a very warm and witty gentleman."

Little Boy: "What are you drinking now?" PAULA: "Diet-Pepsi." Boy: "Ugh-h!!!"

PAULA: "I can see you don't like Diet-Pepsi. Cornelius, what are you drinking?" (she walked over to the table, looked down into his cup, shook her head, Oh Cornelius, be careful with that stuff. It can do strange things to you! (turning back to the boy) Would you believe it? He's drinking STRAIGHT Pepsi!!!"

Jeff asked a few more questions that no one else had thought to ask (most people asked the same questions over and over again), then we reluctantly started for home. But first, we had to shake Cornelius' hand and say our "good-byes".

P.J.: "Good-by Cornelius, it was nice meeting you and Zira."

Cornelius: "Well it was nice meeting the PRESIDENT of our fan club..."

P.J.: "A n-no, no I'm n-not..."

Cornelius: "Oh no, your one of the directors..."

P.J.: "Y-yes, ART DIRECTOR!!!"

Cornelius: "Ah yes, Art Director, it was nice meeting you."

Jeff to Cornelius: "You just gave him a promotion!!!"

And then we were on our way. That's it, there was more I left out but I think I managed to report the cutest, most interesting and important things that were said. Oh don't worry Patty, I didn't take either Cornelius or Jeff seriously, you're still the President (and a darn good one at that)!

On Jan. 19, "C. & Z." appeared as guests on a local weekly news show. During the "Talk & Backtalk" segment, host John McLoughlin called the most popular shows on TV "ridiculous and inane". He attacked Mike Landon & Little House On The Prairie, The Waltons, Marcus Welby, Mary Tyler Moore and our gone-but-not-forgotten favorite, Planet Of The Apes. The direct quotes below were "C. & Z."s rebuttal to his remarks.

Cornelius: "After careful deliberation John, our tribunal of high elders has decided that while the content of your show can be deemed of considerable merit, the conduct of your personal comments must be condemned as abominable. We have watched you perform your verbal antics very carefully John, we have watched your face, already so unattractive with its' utter nakedness of hair, turn a hideous red when you allow your emotions to run away with your controlled reasoning. We have seen you wave your hand with that smelly cigar in punctuation of strong points of personal interest. Now really John, no control, absolutely no control!" Then Zira added: "Have you ever seen an ape rant or rave about justice, equality or the like? Of course not! Never! Where is the restraint, the logical reasoning, the cool dignity so common to apedom? Oh well, what can be expected from a mere human? Keeping the weakness of your basic nature in mind, we have decided to overlook your coarse comments and crude mannerisms. Instead, we consider you as an animal of considerable, although peculiar character. True, it is a big concession, but then we all know the old saying... 'To err is human, to forgive is ape'."

McLoughlin's only comment: "I thought that was Don Rickles in drag!!"
