This letter concerns the comic magazine, Planet of The Apes. Going back to October, the first issue was magnificent. The artwork and tints were without fault; the layout of the magazine was well thought out, and from this one magazine the possibility of a fascinating speciality magazine developing was uppermost in one's mind.

The second issue was, for me, a slight disappointment. The stories themselves were excellent, but this was let down by a shoddily-drawn cover.

All was well with the world until issue 11. In this issue Ka-Zar made his final appearance, "in order to devote more space to behind-the-scene articles and photos of the apes movies and television show" we were informed. I regard this action as a mistake on your part. After establishing a character in the British Marvel scene, and a character so undeniably different, being Marvel's only pre-historic English lad living in tropical Antarctica! He should be allowed to continue with the publication of his stories, the artwork of some being the best Barry Smith ever produced.

The second mistake came with the discontinuation of a continuing back-up story. The culmination of this came with issue 18, when Planet of The Apes took up nine pages, and a one-off science fiction story took up 20!

The "Apes" story from issues 20-22 was atrocious. The sloppy artwork did nothing to improve the boring, almost non-Marvel, story.

The ultimate atrocity came with issue 23. Planet of the Apes has become a name only. The latest stories were re-drawn, re-written, re-prints of the WAR OF THE WORLDS, featuring KILLRAVEN, and **not** Planet of the Apes featuring Apeslayer! Planet of the Apes is now a shadow of what it was before. A dream has been shattered.

Please bring back Ka-Zar. Print Ape stories from the American versions, not re-written War of the Worlds stories. Do this and return Planet of The Apes to its former glory for the sake of the dedicated reader and collector.
