






























## It's APES FANGMAIL time!

Marvel. Notice how the Brit Marv is not merely a Black. and White version, but an enlarged version, showing a fair amount of stress in the reproduction. Now open the New improved Marvel Comic. Doesn't the compacted version seem neater and more efficient in the artwork quality? In actual fact, comparing with the American shows that the reduction in size is only very slight. Looking at it in this completely objectively, I'd say that I didn't go much on the new size at first, but now I prefer it.
