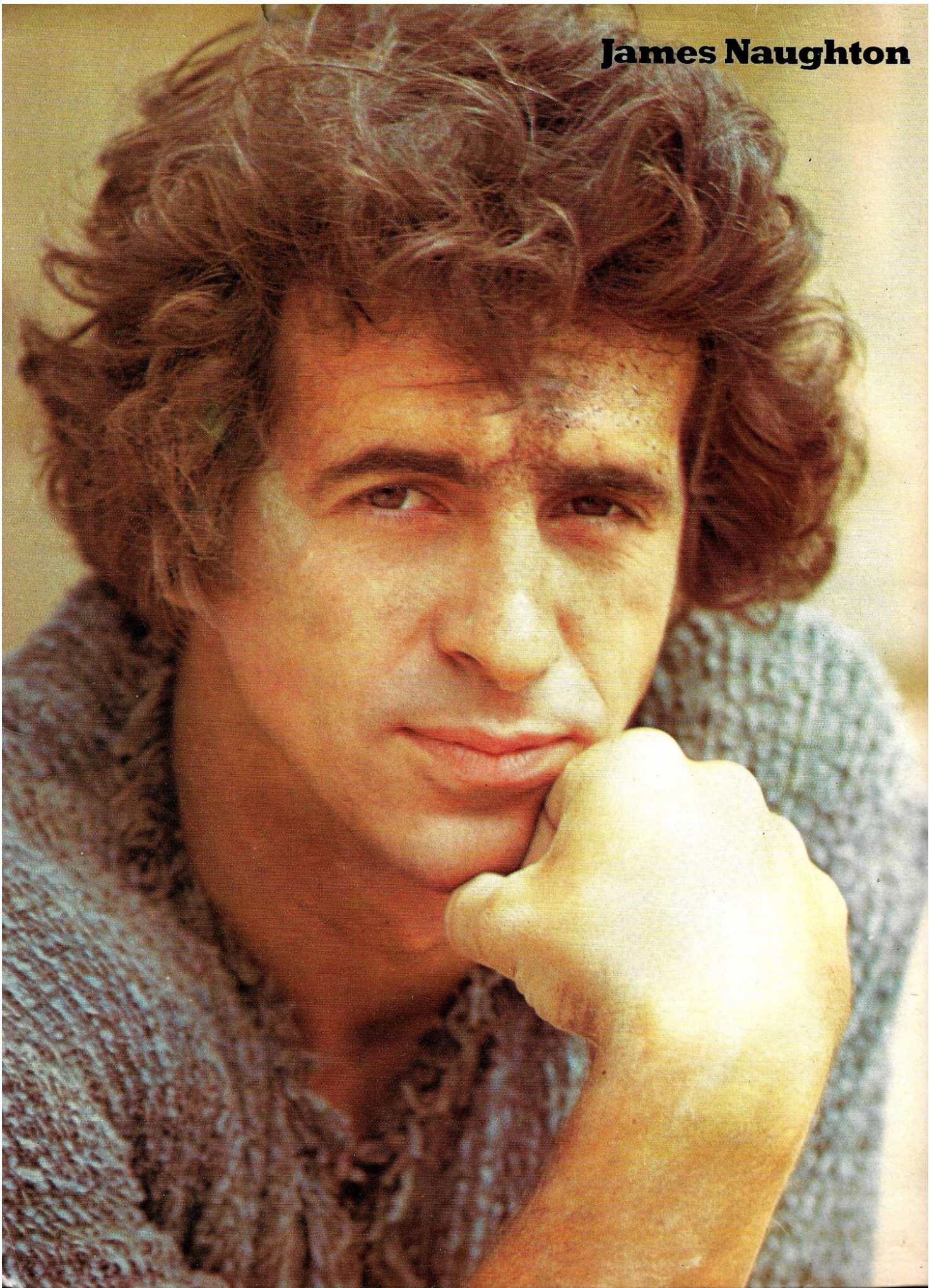

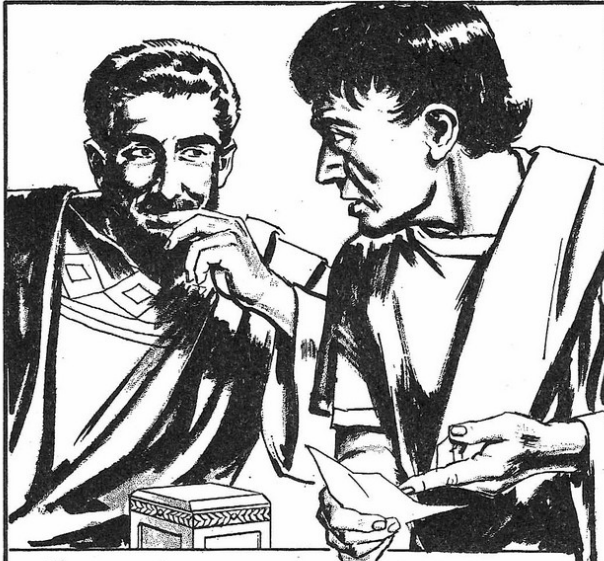

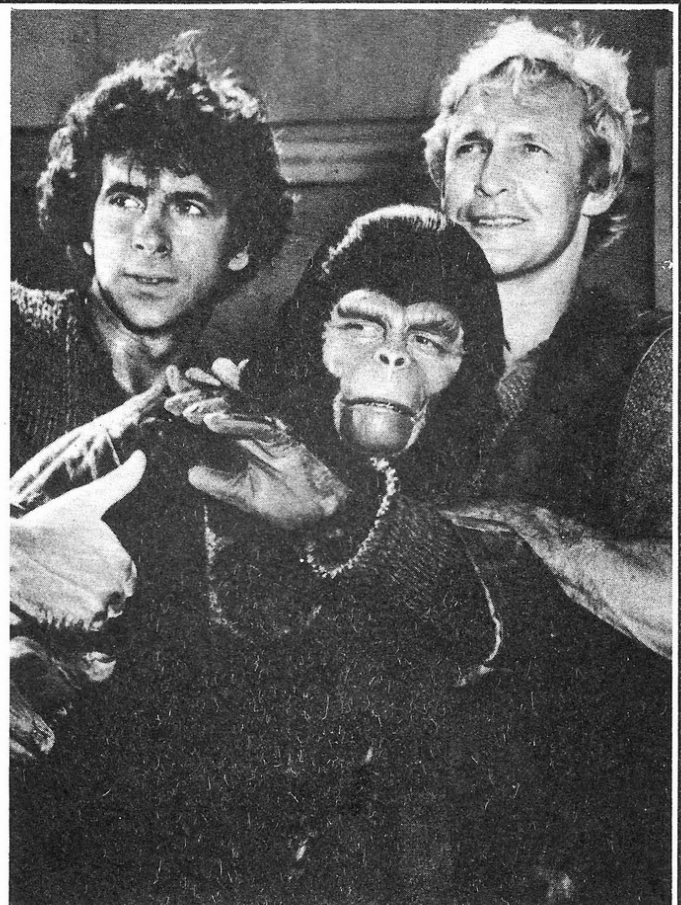


PLANET OF THE APES
